You could feed your hedgehogs!


You could encourage wildlife into your garden. Hedgehogs will like all of these:

garden for bees & butterflies - lots of flowers

Make homes for nature - put up an insect hotel, nestbox or batbox

Add a bird bath (or a small pond if you can)

Make a hedgehog house (& compost heap)

HOMEWORK:


Find out if you have hedgehogs in your garden;

Use the checklist below to see how your garden shapes up for nature!

a) Do you have any of these food features? Bird feeding station	c) Do you have any of these water features?
Nectar rich flowers	Wildlife pond – no fish!
Fruit trees or berry bearing shrubs	Bog / permanently wet area
Perennials left un-cut until spring	Bucket pond
Vegetable patch / container	Garden close to stream or water source
Herb garden	Drought-resistant plants
b) Do you have any of these shelter features?	Bird bath
Dead wood / Log pile / Stone pile	d) Do you have any of these management features?
Climbing plants on wall/trellis (eg. lvy, Honeysuckle, Clematis)	No use of pesticide & slug pellets
Mixed native hedge (eg. Oak, Hazel, Hawthorn, Blackthorn)	Avoid chemical weed killers Compost bin, heap or wormery
Mature trees	Rain butt to save water
Some lawn left to grow long	Use peat free compost
Mini wild flower meadow	
Bird, bat or hedgehog box	
Insect hotel
